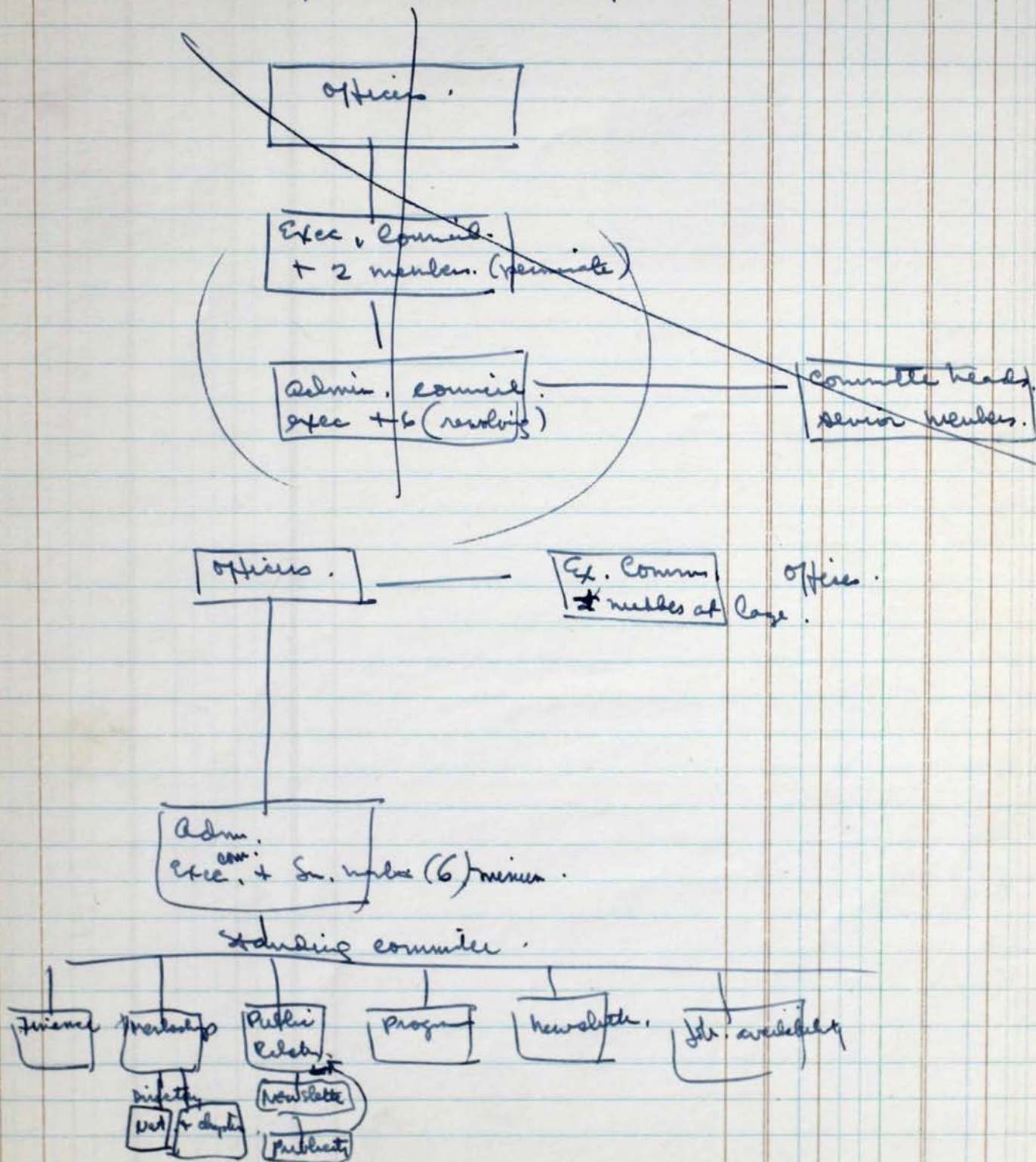

Famed Director Given Honorary Membership in SC Chapter

Motion Picture Director John Huston was initiated as an honorary member of the SC chapter of Delta Kappa Alpha, national honorary cinema fraternity, at the semi-annual initiation banquet Sunday evening.

Cinema Crew Leaves for Iran On Government Film Mission

15 FEB '51

A motion picture crew from the department of cinema will leave today for Iran where it will produce several documentary films in co-operation with the Department of State.

The project will be under the supervision of Max T. Krone, dean of the Institute of the Arts, who leaves Saturday for Washington.

The purpose of the film mission is to produce informational and educational films for the people of the Middle East.

Wilbur T. Blume, cinema department head, said that this will be

a pioneer effort in the direct job of education by film.

"Ninety percent of the people in these middle eastern countries are illiterate. The films will be narrated in Arabic," he said, "and we hope that they will teach these people sanitation, agriculture, and vocations."

Robert Hall, faculty member and county school audio-visual supervisor, will be the writer, William Lauder milk, graduate student who just produced an agriculture film, "Tomorrow's Harvest," will be the rector.

The camera will be manned by John Raymond of the cinema department staff and student Irvin Kerschner. Blume will leave for Syracuse university soon where the group will start the final lap of the journey.

KTTV will televise the crew as they leave at 10:30 today and Fred D. Fagg, Jr., president of the university, will give a farewell message. The films will be sent back to SC for processing. Syracuse university and the University of Minnesota will undertake similar projects

The picture was awarded the prize for the best color film at the International Film Festival in Cannes in 1947. "It can be highly recommended to children from 4 to 80," said Time magazine.

Dialogue is in Russian with English subtitles. A short film will precede tonight's feature.

The remaining movies to be shown are "Don Quixote," "Shors," "All Quiet on the Western Front," and "The General." Tickets are still available at \$3 in the cinema office, 569 West 35th street.

Classics to Show '34 Oscar Winner

"It Happened One Night," 1934's academy award winning film, will be shown tonight at 8 in Hancock auditorium for Film Classics subscribers.

The picture, starring Clark Gable and Claudette Colbert, is the only film that has resulted in Oscars being awarded

its two leading performers. Director Frank Capra also won an oscar for his excellent megging job on the film.

"It Happened One Night" tells the story of a runaway heiress and a newspaperman, on a cross country bus, and the events that lead to their falling in love.

The next picture in the series, "The Stone Flower," is a postwar Russian film. At the Cannes International Cinema Festival it received top honors for its color photography.

On his wedding night he leaves his bride to seek the powerful Goddess whom legend claims guards such a flower deep in the mountain. Here in a realm of unearthly beauty, Danila carves his masterpiece.

'Classics' Slate War Film Run

The Film Classics presentation of "All Quiet on the Western Front," will start tonight at 8 in Hancock auditorium.

Starring Lew Ayres as a young German soldier, the film realistically portrays Erich Remarque's story of war and devastation.

Filmed in 1930 by Lewis Milestone, the film shows the German side of World War I. It opens with a group of German students who are elated over the prospect of going to war. Subsequent scenes show their initiation into training, the front line trenches, the battles of "No-man's Land," the hospital, and, finally, the hillside cemetery of neat white crosses.

Howard Barnes of the New York Herald-Tribune said, "In 'All Quiet' there is no glamour. It is courageously bitter from the first disillusionment of a bunch of German kids in a training camp to the snuffing out of the last of them at the front."

"All Quiet on the Western Front" was re-released last year and shown throughout the country. Monday night's showing will be preceded by a short film.

"The General," starring Buster Keaton, will be shown Monday night, May 21, as the last program of the series.

Mustafa wrote officials in Cairo to see if they could help him land an understudyship with the famed director. It worked, so today Mustafa can boast of three-months experience under deMille.

To work with one of Hollywood's top directors was more than SC student Hussam Mustafa had hoped for when he came to America two years ago to study motion picture production.

Now, when he returns home, the 25-year-old student from Cairo, Egypt, will have had more than two months experience working at the side of Cecil B. deMille, currently directing Betty Hutton and James Stewart in his latest spectacle "The Greatest Show on Earth."

Knowing that deMille had been

in Egypt and liked the country, Mustafa wrote his government from SC expressing his desire to become an understudy to the famed director. An exchange of letters ensued between Cairo and Hollywood resulting in an invitation for Mustafa to visit the Paramount lot.

Mustafa was on the set daily observing the eminent director in action and applying theories he had learned in SC's cinema de-

partment, which deMille helped found in 1928.
