Friendliness Key to Schenck, Paley Made
Big Del Mar Success Every Promise Good

Del Mar, that little jewel box race track down where the surf meets the surf, can well be described as the place where friend meets friend.

With the closing of the 41-day meeting Saturday Del Mar stunned racing critics the nation over by showing an increase in both attendance and handle, while the attendance was just a slim shade off—the only major track in the country with such a record—and this fact can be attributed to one thing, friendliness. Joe Schenck and Jay Paley took over the controlling stock and operation of the track a few months ago and, now at the end of their first meeting, Schenck told me:

"The success of the venture is far beyond any of our expectations, but what pleases me more than anything else is the fact that we haven't had a dissatisfied customer through-

out the entire meeting.

"It proves that if you give the public something it likes, just as in motion pictures, you don't have to worry about support.

"We are now convinced the public is favorable to our track at Del Mar, and we have ambitious plans for the future that will include many innovations and improvements."

Much of the success of the 1948 meeting, however, can be attributed to the type of men that Schenck and Paley had surrounding them—such as Don Smith, president, Harry Brand, "Doc" Bishop, Mark Kelly, Georgie Jessel, Webb Everett, O. L. McKenney, Eddie Read and Frank Roche.

Jessel, who ranks with the late Chauncey De Pew and the late Jimmy Walker among the greatest toastmasters in American history, never was in rarer form than at the press dinner at Del Mar on Friday night when he departed from his characteristic wit for a moment to sound a serious note about the American way of life in which the public always would turn to decent sports for relaxation.

"We in show business know that the people always will support a play with a clean, wholesome situation and the same is true in sports," said Jessel. "Sometimes you can fool yourself but you never can fool the public."

Jessel couldn't stay out of character too long, however, as he quipped:

"Did you hear about the fellow who approached a plunger at the \$100 window and asked:

"Where's the \$2 window?"

"I don't know," scorned the heavy better.

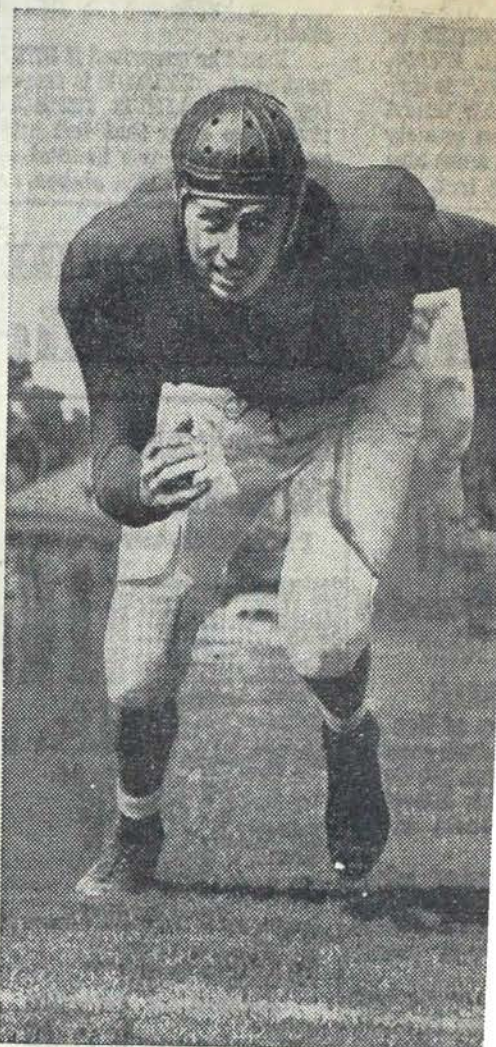
"Well, just stay here and you'll find out," came back our friend."

Maybe it's a bit out of place to mention here, but one of the finest tributes to the Del Mar meeting can be seen by the report of the police authorities. Capt. Earl Riley, under sheriff of San Diego County and in charge of the detail at Del Mar told me that only five extremely minor offenses were reported by the officers during the entire meeting—and their vigilance was constant. This is a credit to both the track and the authorities—and bears out the fact that Del Mar is a spot where friendliness, and not deceit is the watchword.

While the official family at Del Mar is elated over the meeting, the horsemen, too, regard the season as having been tops.

Schenck and Paley made promises of good racing and top and lived up to their end of the bargain in every re-
